Captains to Create Community Spirit

The School Captains in Inverurie Academy can be easily distinguished from the rest with their distinct tartan-like ties and the badges on their blazer displaying their role. School Captains can be easily identified, however many pupils are likely wondering: Who are they? What do they even do? What is their role, and what should we, as a school, expect from our new pupil representatives? It is the purpose of this article to answer just that.

In the academic year of 2024-2025 there are 7 School Captains: Matthew, Eilidh, Cara, Emily, Abbie, Isla and Ellie, who some may already recognise from the assemblies they hosted from the 23rd-28th June (where they introduced themselves and their personal goals for the future).

The position of School Captain requires a significant amount of dedication, with all of the Captains having different motivations as to why they took on the role. Some said that the opportunity would allow them to develop their communication skills both personally and professionally. Others said that they wanted to be able to give back to the school and allow younger pupils to have more of a voice. Alternatively, Isla and Abbie described more personal reasoning for why they vetted for the position with Isla stating that she was inspired originally in S1 by former school captain,

Josh McRae, due to his impact within the school community and the wider Inverurie area. This therefore caused her to want to commit to the role and "follow in his footsteps". Abbie was also inspired to be a school captain as she felt that she could bring different ideas and skills to the position as she "came from a sports background". She further commented that it meant each Captain brought something new to their positions, and that their differing personalities and goals were beneficial in working well together as a team.

The captains were chosen out of multiple candidates earlier this month, having to go through multiple interviews in order to secure their position, which was no easy feat. One of the captains, Eilidh, noted how the whole experience was quite "nerve wracking", however preparation was key and once you "get into the process you are fine".

Cara further explained what the selection process entailed, saying that there were multiple stages in the proceedings in order to progress further. Firstly, they would apply for the role through google forms and then be selected for house captain interviews; if they were successful in that they would then be put forward for school captain interviews. This was the final stage, where Mr Hendry and other senior figures within the school would ask scenario-based questions and observe the candidates responses in order to make their final decision. For instance, questions like the qualities in which they possessed and how that would make them suitable for the role were just some examples that were put before the captains. Other questions got candidates to consider their leadership experience, and even how (if they got the role) would they manage to involve the community in school life?

Ellie's overall consensus was that despite the difficulty of the interview, she felt that it was good practice for any potential job or university interviews in answering difficult questions under pressure.

The captains were keen to discuss their wider goals for the school and what vision they had for the coming year.

Matthew responded to this

saying that he wanted to provide a personal perspective and have a focus on diabetic students, helping them with their transition from primary school and offering them support. He also stated that he wanted to "better the image of the school and to show ourselves in the best light within the community."

Emily echoed this, as she wanted to promote the student voice, however encourage more positive viewpoints as pupils are often very vocal about what they don't like. Instead, she wanted to motivate them to be proud of the school.

Eilidh later expressed the importance of the issue of the environment, urging it to be a focal point as the school produces a significant amount of waste. Her plan to resolve the problem was to "raise awareness about what we as a school could do to solve it." Additionally, she wanted to showcase more of the school's creative talents to the community, potentially hosting a fair as a fundraising opportunity.

Cara vocalised that she was going to take over the school's social media with Emily and create more of a general presence and increase communication within the community, students and parents.

Isla and Abbie added that they wanted to promote the student voice and reform the student council so pupils can talk about issues they are passionate about.

Ellie finally mentioned that she wished to help students to get ready for moving on from the school, wanting to help pupils gain confidence and the skills necessary to leave, as school is a "stepping stone stone and the foundation of life".

All in all, the school captains for the year 2024-2025 clearly have ambitious plans for the future of both our school and the community, aiming to be more than their tartan tie and make important changes. We wish them the very best of luck in their endeavours.


What is your role as House Captain? "To represent my house and give out jobs to the prefects and also help them with what they need to do in the house."


<u>Kathleen</u>

The Raft Race is organised by

Inverurie Scout Group and has been since 2019. The idea of the Raft Race is to "bring some summer cheer and joy to the community whilst having a laugh and welcoming in the summertime."

The raft race is the biggest fundraiser of the year for ISG and helps to keep the Inverurie Scouting movement going. The fundraiser would not be possible without the



fantastic support of Tesco's Extra Inverurie, Morrisons Community Partnership, M&S Inverurie, Farmfoods Inverurie, GPH Inverurie, West High Street Garage Inverurie and the parents of young people within ISG who donate, help on the day and promote the event.

The rafting times varied from 1 hour 15 minutes all the way to 4 hours 37 minutes. The first place winners this year who got the fastest time, coming in at 1 hour 15 minutes, were Kevin & Sean Go Large. The raft team who managed to raise the most money, winning the Best Fundraising award was Prestige Worldwide - arriving into

Inverurie at just under 2 hours 15 minutes. The team who won best decorated raft and came in at 9th

place was Rental Technology and Services Ltd. The best decorated crew trophy went to Fishful Thinking who came in at 10th place. Finally, winning the wooden spoon, the team that came in at the 4 hour 37 minute mark was Tiki Trailblazers.

We have gained a lot of momentum, and in the last months especially we had so many members of staff and different pupils contributing. We are now looking forward to further raising the profile of reading with families and the wider community." Of course, the celebration also included party snacks and mingling. Acknowledging the hard work of both students and staff is a vital aspect of our mission, often overlooked, so it was heartwarming to see so many attendees at the

ceremony.

Another crucial part of our efforts is to encourage networking and discussions about texts and reading. We are therefore excited to introduce Inverurie Academy's very own cookbook - Book Cookery.
